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

Nana:	I'm worried about next week's science class. Have you decided the topic of									
	your presentation?									
David:	(1)-a Have you, Emily?									
Emily:	Yes. I am going to talk about *space travel. I'm now gathering information.									
	Do you have any information about this topic?									
David:	I don't have any information about space travel, but I've just read about Sally									
	Ride. Do you know who Sally Ride is, Nana?									
Nana:	No, I don't. Who's she?									
Emily:	She is famous in the U.S. She was the first American woman that went to space.									
Nana:	Oh, the first American woman astronaut! When did that happen?									
David:	About 35 years ago.									
Nana:	Did any women go to space before that?									
Emily:	In the United States, she was the first, but there were two in Russia before her.									
Nana:	So, Sally Ride was the (2) woman astronaut in the world.									
Emily:	Yes.									
David:	Well, she was good at both science and sports. She was once a tennis player, but									
	she decided to study science more. She studied very hard to become an									
	astrophysicist.									
Nana:	What's that? Astro									
Emily:	Astrophysicist. That's the name for a scientist who studies the *properties of									
	things in space. For example, they study what stars are made of.

David:	Well, one day Sally opened the school newspaper and read the *job ad. Can you									
	guess what she found?									
Nana:	Was it a job ad wanting astronauts?									
David:	(1)-c For the first time, women astronauts were wanted in									
	the United States. After she saw the job ad, she became interested in becoming an									
	astronaut.									

Nana:	The test to become an astronaut is really difficult, and after you pass the test, you									
	have to work really hard at training. Some astronauts have to wait years to go to									
	space.									
Emily:	Oh, you know how to become an astronaut!									
Nana:	Well, I've been interested in becoming one.									
David:	Really? You have a great dream! But why do you want to go to space?									
Nana:	When I saw a picture of Earth in a book, it looked so beautiful. So, I want to									
	see Earth with my own eyes.									
David:	Sally Ride went to space twice and said that Earth looked really beautiful. She									
	understood that it was very important to protect Earth's environment.									
Nana	is now at her host family's home with Mr. and Mrs. King, and their son, Sam.									
Nana:	Today I talked with David and Emily about the first American woman astronaut,									
	Sally Ride. After we talked about her, I wanted to become an astronaut more.									
Sam:	Wow! Do you want to be an astronaut? It's a difficult job. You have to study									
	very hard for it.									
Mrs. King:	Where in space do you want to go? The Moon, *Mars, or other places?									

Nana: I don't know. Maybe the Moon.

Some people are saying that, ten years from now, humans will send people to Mars.

Mr. King: Really? In such a short time? Is that possible?

Sam: We don't know. I hear that a *private company is planning to take people to Mars in 2027!

Mr. King: But Mars is very far from Earth. How long does the trip to Mars take?

Sam: I've just read about it in a book. The trip to the Moon took three days. But the trip to Mars will take 260 days.

Nana: 260 days! That is a long time!

Sam: And that is possible if we leave Earth on a very *specific day at a very specific time, and that time only comes once *every two years.

- *Nana:* I see. I've heard there is a plan to make Mars *livable. Do you think that will happen, Mom?
- *Mrs. King:* Yes, I believe so. I think not only a few astronauts but also *ordinary people are going to live on Mars, and I imagine that some people of your *generation will live there.

Nana: <u>That</u> sounds like *science fiction!

Mrs. King: But many of the things which didn't seem possible years ago have already come true. So, I'm sure that this will also be realized.

In Mr. Brown's science class, Emily has just finished her presentation about space travel.

- *Mr*: *Brown*: Emily gave us some ideas about space travel in the near future. Do you have any comments or questions about her presentation?
- *Nana:* Yes, I have a question. The other day at home, we talked about the project for moving to Mars. In your presentation, you didn't tell us about the project, but you said that some day we would be able to travel space not only from Earth but also from Mars. So, do you believe that we will live on Mars? I'm a little *doubtful about it.
- Emily: Oh, I am not sure, but I would like to say yes. I don't think that anyone can stop us. I mean that humans always want to experience new things. Two million years ago people in Africa *evolved and then slowly *spread around Earth. Since then, we have *made great advances. I'm not saying that science has made everything possible, but still humans will go to new places and make advances. Going to new places and making advances are the things humans do.
- Mr. Brown: That is an interesting comment, Emily. Well, Nana asked a question about living on Mars, so I'll explain some differences between Mars and our planet, Earth. Mars is much smaller than Earth. But the *surface area of Mars that you can stand on is not so small. It is as large as the surface area of Earth that you can stand on, because about 70% of Earth is covered by water. A year on Mars is 687 days. A day on Mars is about as long as a day on Earth, plus 37 minutes. Mars has almost no *oxygen. Mars has four seasons, but some scientists say that the *average temperature is about -50°C. That means it's really cold.

David: Then, it's not possible to live on Mars! Can we make it livable?

Mr. Brown: Well, it is not easy but some people think it's possible. As I told you, Mars is very cold. It has a lot of dry ice and water ice under the ground. Scientists have already found several ways to melt the dry ice. If we can melt the dry ice, CO² will come out into the *atmosphere. Then the water ice will melt because CO² makes the atmosphere warm. In this way, we will have water to drink and use.

David: But still, we need oxygen to live there.

Mr. Brown: You are right, David. Well, when we have water, we can grow trees and plants

on Mars, and then there will be enough oxygen. It will take about a thousand years, but until then, we can use a machine.

Nana: A machine?

Mr. Brown: Yes. CO₂ has oxygen in it. So, a scientist has created a machine which can take out oxygen from CO₂.

Nana: <u>(6)</u> Wow, humans really will be able to live on Mars! That is exciting!

To Yuji, it was just like homework. He thought about $_{(1)}$ it for a long time because it was a question his teacher asked him. It was not different from the homework his math teacher gave his class every weekend. He was not good at math but he always did the homework because it was homework.

"What can you do to *contribute to your community?" Ms. Ogawa asked Yuji and the other members of the *student council this question. Yuji was *chairperson of the student council and Ms. Ogawa was *in charge of them. She often asked them to work for their school. Last summer the student council visited the *kindergarten near their high school and worked as volunteers. They played with the children. They sang songs with them and even danced. They also taught them how to write some *hiragana*. It was a fun experience and Yuji enjoyed teaching those five-year-old children.

However, it was not Yuji's idea to do the volunteer work. He and the other members of the student council did it because Ms. Ogawa asked them to do it. There was a big difference this time. Ms. Ogawa said to them, "Think what you can do for your community. You have to decide what to do by yourself."

Yuji remembered the volunteer work he did when he was younger. Until three years ago, his town had a summer festival every year. One summer in elementary school, he worked as a staff member for the festival. With some *adults, he sold some food to visitors. After the festival, he also cleaned the park with other volunteers. He felt good about doing something for his town. However, again, it was not his own decision to be a member of the festival staff. Maybe some adults he knew asked him to do the volunteer work. Or did teachers in his school ask him to do it? (2)<u>He didn't remember it well now</u>. Maybe he thought it would be fun to do something for his town. Yuji didn't *mind helping other people when they asked him. Actually, the volunteer work was easy because there were always some adults who told him what to do. "How can you contribute to your community?" Once again, Yuji thought about the question Ms. Ogawa asked them.

Yuji called $Manami}_{(4)}$ for some advice. They were both 17 years old and in the same class. She was not a member of the student council, but she was one of his best friends.

Manami and Yuji often talked about the activities of the student council. They sometimes had different ideas and opinions but he always welcomed her *criticism. Yuji *trusted her very much because she always told him her true feelings. Her advice always gave him a new way to look at things.

Manami said to Yuji, "I know you are a good student, and your friends and teachers trust you very much. You never say no when other people ask you to do something. But maybe Ms. Ogawa doesn't think that's enough. I think you should set a goal for yourself and work hard for it. And if you do that, you will experience many things and become more *independent. (5) Maybe she wants you to learn that."

Manami's family once lived in America. She spent ten years in New York before she came back to Japan two years ago. Manami experienced things most Japanese junior high school students didn't. She said to Yuji, "I was surprised that many American *teenagers worked for their communities. They know many different ways to *raise money for people in need. For example, *mowing lawns, washing cars and building *lemonade *stands were very popular ways to raise money. One time, my sister and I built a lemonade stand in front of our house. It was a lot of fun to sell lemonade we made ourselves. Many people in my town came to buy our lemonade."

The story about American teenagers was very interesting to Yuji. After talking with her on the phone, he wanted to read more of the same kind of stories. (6)-a He looked for them on the Internet and found some of them. For example, in one story, high school students in Sydney used their own cars to bring food to old people who couldn't cook or go shopping. There was another story about young people in India (6)-b who did volunteer work to clean temples. From those stories, he found that each country came up with different ways to help their people. (6)-c However, at the same time, he didn't feel it would be possible to do these volunteer activities here in Japan. Yuji said to himself, "Doing the same things that Manami did in (6)-d America won't go well in my community. So, what can I do for people in my town? And how should I do it?" Yuji thought really hard about how to contribute to his community.

Yuji went outside. "Maybe I can find some good ideas if I go for a walk," Yuji thought. He walked around his town. He grew up there, and his grandfather did, too. This was the place his family lived in for a very long time. He remembered his grandfather often took him to the park near his house. While Yuji was playing with other children, his grandfather was always *watching out for them. He was always sitting on the bench near the flower garden. Yuji felt safe because his grandfather was there.

After walking several minutes, Yuji arrived at the park. It was not the same place that he

remembered. It changed into something very different. It was not clean any more. He saw cans and bottles *everywhere. No one took care of the flower garden. It was not a place that people would like to visit any more. Actually, he didn't see any children there. When he was a child, he played on the *slides and *swings, but now they looked old and *dirty. "And where is the bench my grandfather always sat on?" he thought. He found it was broken. It looked very dirty, too. ____Yuji was surprised and sad.

Then, Yuji came up with an idea. "₍₈₎<u>I should do something to bring the park back to life,</u>" he thought. This should be a place that people in this town want to visit. "The first thing I should do is to clean it up. But of course, I can't do it alone. I will ask the members of the student council for help. And do I have to raise money for the park like American teenagers? ... I don't think so," he thought. "Raising money is very important for bigger plans. But right now, taking *action is the most important thing to do. And I don't think just cleaning the park is enough. This park needs something to bring people in this town together. It needs a symbol."

Now, Yuji is going to *repair the bench with the members of the student council. They are going to paint it in rainbow colors, too. That is Manami's idea. "Some people say that the rainbow is the symbol of bringing people together." She gave this advice to Yuji. He hopes that many people will use the bench like his grandfather.

Yuji is also asking some adults in the town to hold its summer festival again. He really wants to do something to help them. Now he is so busy, but he is enjoying it all. This is not something his teachers or other adults asked him to do. This is something he decided to do by himself. This is the goal he set, and he is working very hard for it. Yuji is already feeling good about himself. <u>(a) He feels he has grown up and become a little more independent.</u>
