In New Zealand, it is customary to go see the sunrise on April 25th, listen to the mayor's speech, and watch the soldiers march. The red-petaled flower "poppy" is the symbol of this day, and some people wear poppy flower broches to mark the occasion.

(Asian market)

There is an Asian market near my house. The town is very small, but many people visit it every week. Of course, the market sells a lot of Japanese food and things. What surprised me the most was that they sold bonsai trees. To be honest, I don't know much about bonsai, so I didn't know it was popular overseas, but I'm very happy to know that Japanese bonsai are famous overseas.
