Nao is a Japanese high school student who is staying and studying in the U.S. She is enjoying an art festival with Kate, one of her friends at school.

Nao: It's a very big place!

Kate: Right. This is the biggest festival of art in this area. I hear that 1-a. In addition, there are many kinds of *workshops and *unique shows. Every year, not only the local people but also many people from all over the country visit and enjoy the festival.

Nao: Great!

Kate: Hey, why don't we look at some works over there?

Nao: Sounds good!

Nao and Kate walk to one of the *artists showing his works and talk to him.

Kate: Hi. I like your works. These are really beautiful.

Jack: Oh, thank you. My name is Jack.

Kate: I'm Kate, and this is my friend, Nao.

Nao: Are these all yours?

Jack: Yes. I make one a year and have kept doing that for more than thirty years. I take part in this festival every year and show my new work together with all of the works I made in the past.

Kate: I see. That explains why there are lots of works shown here.

Nao: Each of them looks really unique. They are so 3 from each other. I cannot believe all of them are made by the same one artist.

Jack: You may be right. My style has changed over the period of my life. I always try new and different things. Also, I get ideas from lots of things such as beautiful trees and flowers in my garden, *mysterious goods which I see while I am traveling, the time which I spend with my family, and words which move me while I am reading.

Kate: It sounds *like your works show the history of your life.

Nao: Also, 1-b

Jack: Oh, what is it?

Nao: It's that each person has 3 *aspects to him or her. So, when we talk about a person, we cannot say what kind of person he or she is without knowing several aspects of the person.

After leaving the artist's place, Nao and Kate walk around and find a workshop.

Excuse me. Can we join this workshop? Nao: Sure! Come on! I'm Emily, the teacher of this workshop. Emily: Nao: I'm Nao, and this is my friend, Kate. What can we do here? Emily: This is a painting workshop. You can choose one picture which doesn't have any colors on it and paint it as you like. Then, you can create your own picture. Kate: There are three kinds of pictures and each of us can choose one of them, right? That's right. All of them are the works of famous artists around the world. Emily: Nao: Hey, this picture is really interesting! It looks like a woman's face, but 1-c Kate: Right. It looks like someone *broke up the picture into small pieces and put them together *poorly. Emily: It was painted by *Picasso. He used a unique style which is called "cubism." Nao: Could you explain it more? Cubism is a style of painting which Picasso and his artist friends *Emily:* Sure. developed, and it is one of the most important movements in the history of Western art. Before that, painters looked at things from one point of view and tried hard to draw them as they looked. In cubism works, *on the other hand, things are *analyzed from some 3 points of view, broken up into small *geometrical *figures such as *cubes and put together in *unusual ways. Moeka, Ayano, and Teruo are members of the English club at A High School. After school, they are talking with Ms. Eto, the English club teacher, about the Japanese *manufacturing industry.

Ms. Eto: Many people think that the manufacturing industry is one of the most important industries in Japan, and has a larger influence on *production and *employment than other industries. What are the strong points of the Japanese manufacturing industry? Does anyone have an answer?


Moeka: I think one of the strong points is producing *high-quality and high-performance goods by high skill workers.

Ms. Eto: I think so, too. How about the weak points?


Ayano: Ms. Eto, keeping a large number of workers will be more and more difficult in the future because of a smaller number of children, right?

Ms. Eto: That's right. Small and *medium companies especially are having difficulty in *employing new workers. In 2014-2016, 87.1% of the large companies employed new workers, while just 27.3% of the small and medium companies did so. Another *survey in 2016 shows that the number of young workers who left their company was increasing in 11.8% of the large companies, while the number of young workers who left their company was increasing in 17.3% of the small and medium companies.

Teruo: I hear that some companies are continuing to employ experienced workers who have high skills, even after they reach *retirement age.

Ms. Eto: You are right. Look at [GRAPH I]. *According to [GRAPH I], the largest number of companies were *promoting "Continuing the employment of experienced workers after retirement age" the most. But [GRAPH I] shows there were not so many companies which were going to promote it the most in the future.

Moeka: I am surprised that only a few more companies chose "Employing people from abroad" in [GRAPH I] than in [GRAPH I]. I thought more companies were positive about employing a lot of people from abroad in the future to solve the problem of a smaller number of children.

Ms. Eto: Some companies may think that it is difficult for people from abroad to follow the Japanese way of life and learn the Japanese language. If they want to work in Japan for a long time, they will have lots of difficulty with the Japanese working environment because it is too strict for them. In my opinion, it is necessary to improve it more.

Ayano: Please look at [GRAPH II]. The activities a lot of companies were going to promote the most in the future were "Promoting the use of IT" and "Solving the problem of *labor shortage by introducing robots". "Promoting the use of IT" in [GRAPH II] was almost four times *compared to that in [GRAPH II]. And the total of both in [GRAPH II] was more than 40%. That means the main point of view will change from continuing the employment of experienced workers to introducing robots and promoting the use of IT, right?

Ms. Eto: That's true. Introducing robots into new fields will make working more *efficient and the power of producing things stronger than now. Promoting the use of IT will lead to original programs for producing goods. And it will be helpful in putting high technology into *databases. In other words, that will

lead to efficient *intellectual work and also companies will be able to keep their strong point, workers' high skills.

Moeka: I think that will reduce working hours and bring changes to working style, too.

Then, more new workers will stay in the same company for a long time. Look at [GRAPH I]. "Introducing different working styles" was less than 5%. But "Introducing different working styles" in [GRAPH I] was more than three times compared to that in [GRAPH I].

Teruo: I agree. If the working environment is improved, workers will be positive about working and the power of producing things will be increased.

Ms. Eto: There is one more good point. By promoting the use of IT, databases will be useful in checking what goods people really want. And that will produce added *value. Companies cannot survive only by manufacturing goods.

Ayano: Ms. Eto, companies can't depend only on experienced workers to keep the skills of the Japanese manufacturing industry high. Also, they can't promote the use of IT without developing workers who know how to use IT.

Ms. Eto: That's a wonderful idea. Nothing is more important than developing great workers and attracting them to the manufacturing industry.

Teruo: By the way, Ms. Eto, I wonder what efforts companies are making to attract young people to the manufacturing industry. Could you tell us about them?

Ms. Eto: For example, to teach students manufacturing skills, some education *institutions send trainers to industrial high schools. Other institutions are making efforts to check local needs and companies' needs to develop efficient training courses and ways to teach skills.

Ayano: I hear several contests such as *the National Skills Competition are held.

Those contests will encourage young people to get high manufacturing skills, right?

Ms. Eto: You are right. When they have decided to take part in that kind of contest, they spend a lot of time in practicing for the contest.

In addition, there is a national skills test which *judges the skills of workers by using the same judging system. This test really encourages manufacturing workers.

Moeka: Are young people given chances to take manufacturing training courses or to listen to people who have actually experienced such courses? If they have such chances, they won't be so worried about their new working environment.

Teruo: How about using websites to attract young people to the manufacturing industry?

Ms. Eto: Both of your questions have a good point of view. I understand some companies and institutions are doing such activities. Anyway, I hope that they will spread the good points of this industry all over Japan in many different ways.

Moeka: I think it is important to increase the number of children who are interested in science and math, too.

Ms. Eto: That's true. 4 is an important point of view. I think that the Japanese Government should support junior high school and high school students who are interested in science and math activities. That will be helpful in developing workers who can create new things in the field of science and technology. Do you know what else about education is useful for that?

Ayano: In my opinion, the manufacturing industry will be in need of international workers in the future. So what do you think of encouraging students to study abroad?

Ms. Eto: That's a good idea. It will also be good to make Japan's university education more international by promoting *exchange programs with foreign institutions in the field of science and technology.

Teruo: I am so interested in technology that I want to take technology classes in English at college.

Ms. Eto: OK. That's enough for today. You've given me lots of useful opinions from several points of view. I am so glad. Finally, I want to tell you this. Companies, education institutions, and the Japanese Government should work together to develop great workers in the manufacturing industry. Let's hope that the Japanese manufacturing industry will develop more and more.

From Judy to Meg

How are you, Meg? I have a question today. It's about the Japanese way of taking a bath. I remember the days of my stay with you. I talked to my friends and family about my stay in Japan. My parents are surprised to learn that all your family members enjoy taking a bath several days a week. They think that taking a *shower is better than taking a bath to save water. Of course, I always took a shower during my stay in Japan. I've found an English *phrase, "to spend money like water," in a dictionary. It means using too much money when it's not necessary, but I don't believe that this phrase should be used in its original meaning in my country today.

In Japan, things may not be the same. I know you have a lot of rain. Japanese people don't have to think much about saving water, and you can often take a bath. Am I right? Bye.

From Meg to Judy

Hi, Judy. You only took a shower during your stay with us. I didn't know that. You didn't enjoy relaxing in hot water. I feel very sorry for that. I didn't tell you how to take a bath in the Japanese way. I thought you knew the Japanese way of taking a bath, but actually you didn't. You have found an interesting phrase, and so I thought of a Japanese phrase, "to spend something like water." It has almost the same meaning as the phrase you have found. But my country is not so large, and a lot of people live in it. So today, Japanese people try to save water, and I don't think it's a good phrase to use in Japan anymore.

Do you know the Japanese way of taking a bath is good for saving water? American people usually wash their body in the *bathtub when they take a bath. It means that when a person takes a bath after someone else, the water in the bathtub is not clean and has to be changed. However, Japanese people wash their body outside the bathtub, in the *space next to the bathtub. And then, we get into the hot water and relax. So the water in the bathtub is clean and we don't need to change water so often.

The Japanese way of taking a bath is good for saving energy, too. We put a *lid over hot water in the bathtub. We put the lid away to take a bath, and when we get out, we put the lid back. So the water in the bathtub is always hot. In this way, all my family members can use the same hot water, and we can save energy.

door after using the bathroom when you stayed with us. Of course, that was OK. No problem. Hi, Meg. Thank you for your information about the Japanese way of taking a bath. It's interesting that both English and Japanese have phrases that are so similar to each other. However, their original meaning is *outdated now. I thought that all your family members needed to change water in the bathtub, but I was wrong. You often take a bath, but now I know that you still have your own way of saving water.

Now, about your bathroom door question. In fact, I don't understand why all your family members close the bathroom door after using the bathroom. When you don't close it, other people easily know that there is no one. Of course, my parents agree with me, and don't say anything when I don't close the door after using the bathroom. If I do, they will tell me to open it a little. My friends, neighbors, and many other Americans do so. This is my answer to your question.

May I ask some more questions, Meg? I remember your family washed the clothes and *dried them on your *upstairs balcony almost every day while I was staying with you. You had a *dryer for clothes, but you never used it. That's very different from our way. We do the washing only once a week to save water. We always use the dryer and we don't dry our clothes outside the house. If you use the dryer, you can save time and you don't need to think about the weather. Why do you wash your clothes so often, and why do you dry them outside the house? These are my questions. Bye.

From Meg to Judy

Hello, Judy. Your é-mail about the bathroom door was interesting. Thanks a lot. In Japan, many people just *knock on the bathroom door to *make sure that it's empty. Americans think that the person in the bathroom may feel bad if they knock on the door, and they don't want to do such a thing. At first, I just thought you forgot to close the bathroom door all the time. Now I know why you do not close the door after using the bathroom. And you know why I always closed your bathroom door after using the bathroom during my stay with you.

[5] I have found there are some differences between Japanese and American customs and lifestyles. That's really interesting, and I think I've learned something important.

Now I'm going to answer your questions about washing and drying clothes. We think that it's easy to clean dirty clothes if we wash them soon. So we wash clothes almost every day. However, we reuse the water from the bathtub for washing clothes to save water. The weather was fine while you were staying with us, so we dried the

clothes outside the house. We can save energy if we don't use the dryer and *hang our clothes out in the sun. My parents usually check the weather on TV and sometimes use the dryer when the weather is bad. But if it only rains a little, it's OK because our upstairs balcony also has a *roof.

I think that many Japanese people like drying their clothes in the sun. This is not only because they can save energy but also because they feel good in clothes dried in the sun. I love wearing shirts and other clothes dried in the sun. Love you. Bye.
