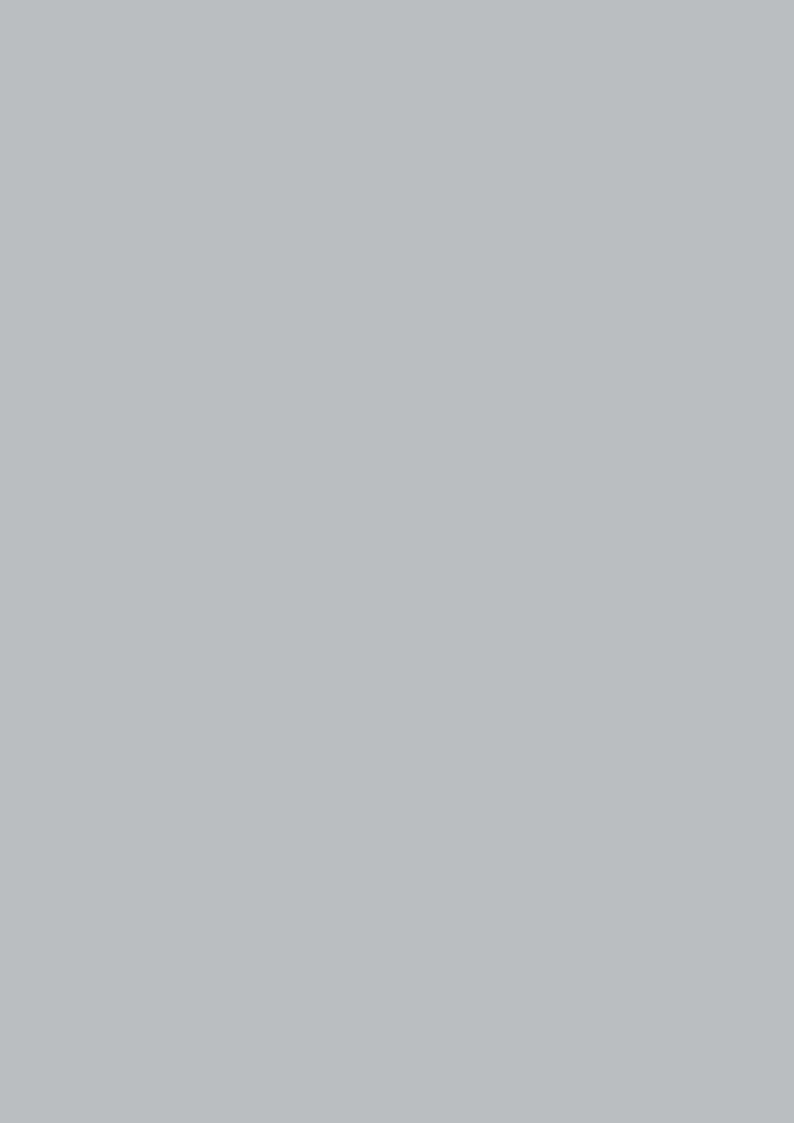

Mayu: Origami-inspired technology is popular now. For example, special panels are

used for the floors of the Shinkansen. They can *absorb shock. There are also

origami-inspired cans, plastic bottles and....

Jane: Mayu, I have a map in my bag. My host mother bought it for me in Kyoto last

week. Here it is. Are *origami* skills used in this map, too?

Mayu: Oh, yes! If you pull two corners of the map, you can spread it in one *motion.

Why don't you try it, Yuta?

From Satoshi" After he finished reading the postcard, Takuto said to himself, "I remember our promise really well, Satoshi. But my dream.... What is my dream?"

The next day, after the practice of the soccer club, he left school with Keita. Keita was one of his teammates and his best friend. Takuto said, "Keita, do you have any plans for the future?
